



Andrew Dierkes is a nurse, researcher, and entrepreneur. He works at the bedside of medical-surgical inpatients at Pennsylvania Hospital, which grounds his academic work as a postdoctoral fellow at the University of Pennsylvania. Together, his experience at the nation's first hospital and top-ranked school of nursing have exposed the need for improved nurse staffing and assignment-making processes, as well as the potential for an evidence-generating approach to help hospital administrators save money, charge nurses save time, and bedside nurses save lives. The resulting startup has received over \$50,000 from the National Science Foundation and is seeking additional funding to take it from a side project to a primary effort. Aside from his professional pursuits, Andrew

enjoys volunteering as a member of the finance council for a not-for-profit organization in West Philadelphia, playing music (often the pipe organ), traveling, and working on DIY home renovations.




