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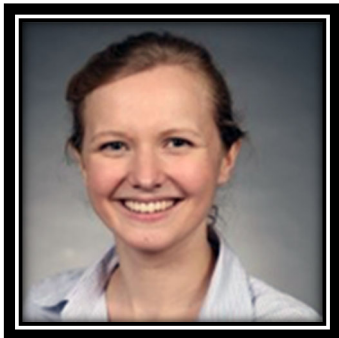

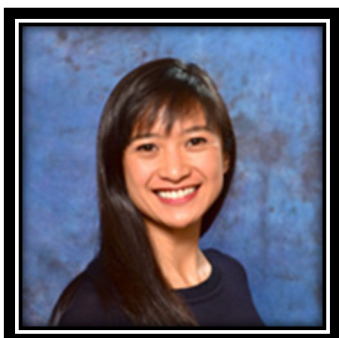

Andrew Dierkes is a nurse, researcher, and entrepreneur. This is especially important in low-resource settings and among vulnerable patient populations. The resulting startup is actively engaged in software prototyping and is seeking partnerships to advance its research, development, and beta testing. The National Science Foundation and the Rita and Alex Hillman Foundation have both funded this work in the past and are currently reviewing proposals for continued funding. This fall, Andrew will join the faculty at the University of Pittsburgh School of Nursing in a tenure stream position as an assistant professor.

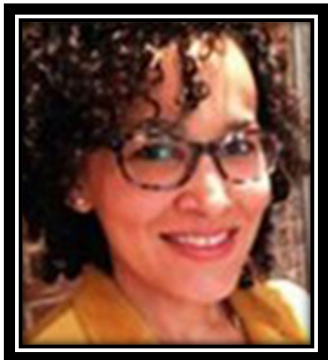

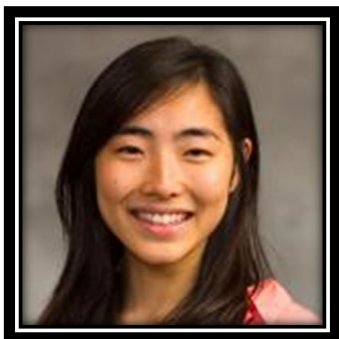

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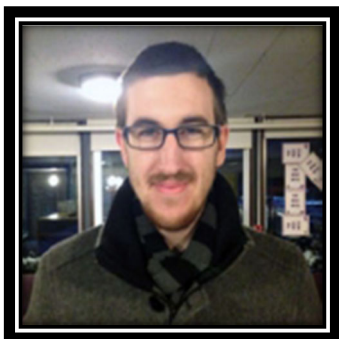
